Dear Governor Sununu:

A broad and extensive cross-section of the public has communicated with state board members on the nomination of Mr. Edelblut as education commissioner. Since his Executive Council hearing, we have had a large number of phone calls and emails and today many people have come to comment. Others have expressed themselves in the press. Virtually all have expressed concerns about the appointment, primarily about the nominee's lack of relevant qualifications in both "education and experience."

In addition, board members had questions of their own pursuant to the board's statutory responsibility to oversee the operations of the department of education. Here are our queries and your responses from today's consultation:

In your judgment, in what respect does Mr. Edelblut meet the "qualified by education and experience" requirements of RSA 21-N:3?

Yes. The requirements for commissioner are different from those for an educator. He must be prepared to manage a large system, communicate with legislature, and communicate with the many other constituencies of New Hampshire public education. He has a great understanding of how the system works and where we should go. He has a great depth of knowledge.

Will you require Mr. Edelblut to forgo political activism while serving?

The position itself should not be political. The commissioner must work with people from all sectors and across the political spectrum.

The governor did not appear to respond directly on the question of whether he would allow Mr. Edelblut to participate in political activities.

Has Mr. Edelblut committed to serving out his 4-year term as commissioner?

The governor had a one-word answer, "Yes."

Given Mr. Edelblut's lack of familiarity with the management of public education, how would he gain the trust and credibility among superintendents, principals and teachers needed to lead in this local control state where the levers of command and control are not available?

Mr. Edelblut has said that one of his first initiatives will be to take a "brown bag tour" across the State. He will sit down one-on-one with educators, school leaders, students, everyone. People will realize his depth of knowledge. No one coming into this position should be able to rely on a resume. They should have to prove their ability to perform. Mr. Edelblut will do that.

Mr. Edelblut says that school choice is important because "parents are voting with their feet." Actually, the numbers are pretty small. How would you and Mr. Edelblut balance your commitment to those students with your commitment to the 180,000 students in New Hampshire's district schools and our current home grown charter schools?

The question is based on a misunderstanding of what Mr. Edelblut and the governor mean by "choice." Actually, the focus is on the choice each individual student has to conform her or his educational path to be prepared for a chosen career. Establishing career pathways in high school is not sufficient. Students should be able to identify their pathways much sooner in their educational careers and be supported by their schools in pursuing those pathways whether through our career schools or other forms of coursework leading to post-secondary education.

What should be done at this point about the math and English Language Arts standards given the virtually full adoption by the field? Would a review of the standards be good?

The governor said first that review could be called for, that review of anything is always good. But mainly he wanted to be clear that he and Mr. Edelblut agree that standards are a good thing and are necessary. Yes, they have publically opposed the common core standards but it's not really the standards that are the issue. It's how we assess these standards. He said he very much believes in assessments but that whoever had the idea of publishing the results in the newspaper had a terrible idea. The result is that teachers feel they teach to the test to avoid public criticism.

The governor summed up by saying that perceptions that he and Mr. Edelblut wanted to blow up public education are erroneous.

How can the support for vouchers be reconciled with New Hampshire's constitutional prohibition against using public money for "the support of schools of any sect or denomination" (Article 6)?

The governor said he was open to a potential voucher system and that constitutional and other issues would need to be worked out as we go along.

If substantial numbers of parents in any school refuse to let their children take the annual statewide assessment, the tests will not reflect the performance of that school. So is support for bills encouraging refusal of assessments that give parents feedback on their schools consistent with constitutional obligation to provide an adequate education?

If there are many people opting out of the statewide assessment, the question would be why is that happening?

He absolutely supports parent refusal to participate in the statewide assessment. He acknowledged that there are repercussions, and maybe negative repercussions, we'd have to figure that out.

Has Mr. Edelblut foresworn investments in education related ventures?

The governor gave the impression that he had not discussed this question with *Mr.* Edelblut and said, "I would assume so."

We understand Mr. Edelblut to have said at his hearing that he wants to give teachers greater freedom to decide what to teach in their classrooms. Would the governor be concerned if teachers taught creationism, climate denial, that homosexuality is unnatural, etc. in New Hampshire classrooms.

The governor clarified that, "We are not saying do what you want." But they do want to give teachers flexibility in how they meet the State's academic standards. He went on to say that we definitely need state-wide standards, oversight, and management of educators.

New Hampshire educators and the state board are deeply engaged in transforming public education for the 21st century, through personalized competency education, the PACE initiative. Is that a vision you and Mr. Edelblut share?

I believe so. I've talked with Mr. Edelblut about PACE. I'm very encouraged by the results we have seen and I would look forward to seeing Mr. Edelblut expand on that.

Will NH respond to the requirements and timelines of ESSA?

I will review that but I expect so.

Would you ensure that money for choice does not come at the expense of district schools?

When a system is looking for more money, we need to provide more financial flexibility to allow that system to meet its priority needs and to meet the goals we set out for ourselves, not necessarily the goals that Washington sets. Anywhere we can break down the regulations that might not be applicable to those local communities, that's a good thing. And Mr. Edelblut really understands the numbers.

Parents have expressed a concern about Mr. Edelblut's commitment to special education. What can you say about that?

The governor said he had the utmost confidence in Mr. Edelblut's commitment to serve children with special needs. That will be a top priority. He will make sure that, not just at the teacher level but at the administrative level, schools have all the support and flexibility they need to support children with special needs.

We have attached 57 pages of individually composed emails and communications we have received from concerned citizens, mostly parents in opposition to this nomination. We did hear testimony from one person this morning in support of Mr. Edleblut's nomination.

After discussion with the public today and among board members, we have to say, Governor, that we share the public's concerns about Mr. Edelblut's qualifications for the role of New Hampshire Education Commissioner. The high level of concern parents have voiced about this nomination that is so important to them puts the State Board of Education on notice. We owe parents the Board's full commitment to our statutory responsibility as the board of directors of New Hampshire public education. We are prepared for that role and will exercise it with full transparency.

Greetings, Board Members --

I was dismayed to learn that the so-called vetting process of Frank Edelblut for Commissioner of Education was primarily superficial and hope that you will be taking the time to consider citizens' concerns as you take the next step. I write to ask that you vote against the confirmation of Mr. Edelblut. Surely the Governor could find a different, better-qualified candidate. That would no doubt have become clearer to you with a more forceful vetting process.

Here are my concerns:

First and foremost, Edelblut has no experience as an educator. (How one can even consider candidates for any office who have no experience in the field is beyond my understanding.)

Second, PUBLIC education is the fundamental underpinning of both a successful economy and democratic society. It is through exposure to multiple different views that we grow and learn to work together and from which innovation stems. Any diversion of funding away from public education harms us all. A Commissioner of Education who is focused on charter schools rather than on public schools would not be serving the majority of New Hampshire residents.

Third, political and religious ideology (let alone outdated and misguided *theories*) have no place in any educational institution that serves the broad public. Nonpartisan: both you and any new Commissioner. Can't say it strongly enough.

Fourth, any Board member vote based on Republican or Democratic affiliation betrays our SHARED goal of creating a citizenry that can inform itself via critical thinking and that chooses to contribute to our shared society. We are all in one boat. We need to row together if we are not just to remain floating but to move forward.

Your job is to vote for a Commissioner who:

-- Provides leadership that distinguishes between fact and opinion, who applauds science and the associated rigor and objectivity associated with the scientific discipline and approach to challenges. There are no *alternative facts.* Opinion and belief must not be elevated to equal status as fact.

-- Brings relevant experience and promotes vision to guide New Hampshire into the increasingly global and stormy waters of our future.

-- Commits to broadening -- not narrowing -- opportunities to help New Hampshire's future citizens.

Thank you for your work on behalf of all of us, regardless of our political orientations and private beliefs. I'm sure that we all want the best for our state's future.

Greetings Members of the NH State Board of Education,

I am very concerned with Governor Chris Sununu's nomination of Frank Edelblut for the Commissioner of Education for New Hampshire. I am a school board member serving on the Hampstead School Board, a PTA member, an active volunteer in Hampstead's schools and a mother of two students who are 7 and 10 years old and thriving in our public education system. I support education and am aware of the many obstacles and triumphs that exist within the system.

Education is a constantly evolving field. Much of the measurable success that Hampstead displays is due to the dedicated administrators, faculty, staff, parents, volunteers and community members who support our students in public education. Hampstead uses researched based initiatives, well thought out implementations and tremendous collaborative efforts to continuously achieve excellence in education.

The Education Commissioner of NH is a role that is best filled by an educator, which Frank Edelblut is not. I would like to address this letter to all the NH Board of Education members : Cindy C. Chagnon, Bill Duncan, Gary Groleau, Helen Honorow, Gregory Odell, Tomas Raffio, and Emma Rous.,

I am unable to attend the public hearing this coming Thursday February 9th concerning the Nomination of Frank Edilblut by Governor Sununu for Commissioner of Education in NH. I would like my objections to be known to all of you despite being unable to say it in person.

I have already informed Governor Sununu that I believe he made a flawed decision to nominate Frank Edelblut and hope he will withdraw this nomination. I have requested the Executive Council all vote against this appointment when it was apparent that our Governor was not going to discuss this nomination with the Board of Education prior to their vote. I have submitted letters to the Editor of newspapers pointing to Frank Edelblut's lack of qualifications and commitment to Public Education. In all my appeals to the conscience of the Governor and others, I have explained my reasons as follows:

Frank Edelblut has no public school experience, no formal background or training in education. He has not served on a local school board. He failed to support Public Education in our state by not even enrolling one of his 7 children in a public school. More distressing than any of these legal reasons why he should not be appointed (education and experience) is his record as a one term State Representative. He voted to take taxpayer money and put it to use at private and religious schools. He voted against full-day kindergarten. He voted for allowing parents and guardians to opt their students out of statewide assessment testing. I also object to Frank Edelblut being my Commissioner of Education because he voted against banning unethical gay conversion therapy. Subject: Concerns about Protecting the Rights of ALL Students in NH Public Schools

Dear Mr. Raffio,

I am a parent and I have grave concerns about the nomination of Frank Edulblut for the position of Commissioner of Education for New Hampshire and I wanted to make sure my concerns are heard, especially since I feel there are very important issues at stake that have not been questioned or explored by the executive counsel as of yet. I attended the confirmation hearing last week, driving a round trip of 3 hours to do so, with the hopes of speaking, however, had to leave before having the opportunity to do so.

I heard that one of the councilors felt that the message they had received from the "consumers" was one of discontent with public education and in favor of this nomination. I would argue that the "consumers" the executive counsel heard were a small minority, and hope that the Executive Council, Board of Education, legislators, and the Governor ensure that a diverse perspective is heard, to include working families who may have not been able to attend.

I was disappointed that none of the executive counselors asked Mr. Edulblut some very important questions about students who have disabilities and chronic medical conditions. Therefore I will pose them here in hopes that the State Board of Education, though not in a position to vote on the issue of Mr. Edulblut's nomination, will consider and advise the governor on the full spectrum of issues that confirmation of this candidate, given the agenda he expressed in regards to school choice, will have on our public school system and the local towns who work very hard to make their schools great.

Questions:

If confirmed for the position of Commissioner of Education for the state of New Hampshire, would Mr. Edulblut:

- require equal accountability in ALL schools and educational programs that receive taxpayer funding?
- Require that private schools and public charters that receive public funding accept all students and cannot deny admission based on race, color, religion, national/ethnic origin, age, gender, sexual orientation, or disability?
- support the requirement that all schools that receive public funding provide the necessary services and support mandated by IDEA and Section 504 for student who have disabilities to ensure equal access to all available programs and choices?
- propose that funding for special education supports, health services, and related service for students who have disabilities and healthcare needs attending these non-traditional settings, be the responsibility of the Charter or private school or the student's home town and school district? The latter, expecting the home school district to divide it's personnel or fund additional personnel to provide services to students at multiple school locations, would take away resources from the traditional public school and add significant financial burden on the local community to raise funding through taxes.

I feel the answer to these questions are imperative for New Hampshire citizens and should be strongly considered before a vote is made in regards to this confirmation. It was evident by those present at Mr. Edulblut's confirmation hearing, that he is well supported by school choice advocates. However, very few specific questions regarding his vision for this and the impact of school choice on our traditional schools, students, and towns were asked.

I would like to take a minute to share the needs of thousands of New Hampshire public school "consumers". According to a 2011-2012 National Survey, there were over approximately 59,000 children (0-17 years of age) who met the broad definition of children with **special health care needs in NH**.

I am the parent of a child who has a chronic medical condition, epilepsy, who requires a school health plan and implementation of an emergency action plan which includes medication administration. In addition to epilepsy, there are several other chronic medical conditions that require school nursing support to enable students to safely access their education including, but not limited to: Type I diabetes, severe allergies which lead to anaphylaxis, asthma, cardiac conditions, metabolic issues, and gastrointestinal conditions.

A NH school nurse survey conducted by *Special Medical Services* in 2014 (<u>http://www.education.nh.gov/instruction/school health/documents/schoolnurse</u> <u>survey-2014.pdf</u>) reported that in addition to providing oral medication, monitoring blood glucose, providing nebulizer treatments, providing toileting assistance, and bowel program support, NH school nurses reported having 30 students on average with rescue medications (to treat medical emergencies in students with epilepsy, diabetes, and asthma), with some schools having far greater numbers into the hundreds.

Limitations in availability of school nurse services can have grave impact on students with chronic medical conditions and could even have life threatening consequences. Reliance on local EMS services to address these students' needs can be insufficient in rural communities which rely on volunteer fast squads, which are unable to guarantee a medical professional with the needed training and scope of practice to meet the medical demand.

According to the NH Department of Education *Statewide Census by Disability*, more than 28,800 NH students have diagnosed disabilities.

(http://www.education.nh.gov/instruction/special ed/documents/child count oct ober 1 2015.pdf). Many of these students require special education services to benefit from their education. This may include specialized instruction from special education teachers, related services including speech therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, behavior specialists, and, for some, educational assistant support. Our public schools are mandated to meet the needs of **ALL** students and provide the necessary supports and services each individual student needs to make effective progress in their educational program.

The following scenario allows examination of the many questions and concerns that arise from the prospect of a model of school choice, whereby, public funds are diverted from traditional public schools to private or public charter schools for a student to attend by choice. If a charter or private school does not currently employ a school nurse or has limited number of nurse hours, and a student who requires school nursing support chooses to attend, under a plan of school choice that Mr. Edulblut might promote, will that school need to hire a nurse to meet those medical needs or will the school have the right to deny that student's right to a free and appropriate public education in that setting? Would the private or charter school be required to fund a nursing position as to not discriminate against that student, or would the student's home school district be expected to divide it's personnel or fund additional personnel to provide services at the alternate school location, thus taking away resources from the traditional public school and adding significant financial burden on the local community to raise funding through taxes?

Currently, students with disabilities and chronic medical conditions often have to sign away their rights under IDEA and Section 504 to attend private and non-traditional schools, a practice that should be absolutely unacceptable if these schools begin to receive any public funding.

I am concerned that if the Commissioner of Education is not knowledgeable about IDEA and Section 504 and/or pushes an agenda to use government money to fund charter or private schools without holding them equally accountable to our public

schools to meet the needs of students with chronic medical conditions and disabilities, it will be discriminatory practice and undermine our public school systems.

In summary, is **Mr. Edleblut in support of school choice for everyone regardless** of whether they have a condition or disability or is he in support of a system that offers choice only for those who can afford it and have no exceptional needs? The latter, in my opinion, would have the potential to take our system back several decades to a more segregated educational system. Please do not support Mr. Edelblut for this position unless he will meet the following fundamental requirements of this role:

- guarantee that all students will be able to access all aspects of the state's public education system regardless of wealth, race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, or disability.
- Fully support and ensure equal accountability of schools that receive federal, state, or local funds to meet the needs of all students.

Thank you for your time in considering these concerns, discussing them within the domain of your role now as this nomination is considered, as well as in the future, as policies, practices, and legislation regarding education in NH are being developed.

In addition, based on his testimony before the Council, I am concerned that he does not intend to fulfill the full term of the appointment. I sincerely hope this is not the case, as our students deserve a Commissioner who is fully committed to the role and to public education, not someone looking to use the position as a stepping stone to something else. I am concerned that when directly asked about serving a full term by Executive Councilors, Mr. Edelblut was evasive and noncommittal.

I hope that you will take my comments with you to Concord, and press the Governor on how he determined that someone with no experience in public education was the right person to lead public education in the state. Respectfully,

I am writing this letter to strongly oppose the nomination of Frank Edelblut as the NH Education Commissioner. As a parent of 3 children, I do not think that Mr. Edelblut has the qualifications needed to lead this critically important leadership role for NH's public education system. Here are the reasons that I urge you to vote "No":

- Mr. Edelblut does not have any experience as an education, a school administrator, or as a parent of children who attend public schools. This is extremely concerning due to the complexities of the various constituencies that the position must manage Administrators, Teachers, Therapists, Paraprofessionals, Parents, and Students.
- I am extremely concerned about Mr. Edelblut's interest in moving to a private voucher system or school choice system that would take tax payer dollars out of the public school system and into private, faith-based schools. Will all NH students have equal access to these schools, and how will Mr. Edelblut ensure

that private schools uphold the federal mandates of IDEA. I do not see private vouchers as adding any value to our public education system, but rather it undermines it. This will take funding and resources away from public schools, leaving marginalized groups like low income students and students with disabilities behind as they will be left in underfunded schools.

- I am concerned about Mr. Edelblut's lack of experience with implementing and supporting IDEA and ADA, particularly given the complexities of educating students with disabilities and medical challenges. We chose to live in Londonderry due to the high quality of the school system and because it supports inclusion. My youngest daughter has Down syndrome, is 12 years old, and she is in the 6th grade at Londonderry Middle School. She is thriving because she is included and concurrently is able to get the services she needs to meet her needs. We know from the research that in most cases, kids with disabilities demonstrate more growth in academics, speech and language, social and interpersonal skills, and fewer behavior challenges when educated in an inclusive environment – how does Mr. Edelblut plan to lead our students in this regard?
- I have 2 sons who attend UNH in Durham and would like to know how Mr. Edelblut plans to make college more affordable for NH residents. Both of my sons will graduate with enormous debt due to the high cost of our state schools, and we have also have a heavy debt burden through the Parent Plus loans. What are Mr. Edleblut's plans to make higher education more affordable to middle and low income students?

It is very clear to me from the initial hearing and the public information available about Mr. Edelblut that he does not have the knowledge or expertise, nor the vision needed to lead our public education system. I urge you to put our children FIRST and vote no on his confirmation.

Dear Members of the New Hampshire Executive Council and State Board of Education,

Thank you for this opportunity to contribute to the record before you pertaining to the nominee for the Commissioner of Education for our State.

By way of introduction, my family moved to New Hampshire thirty years ago this June, and our children attended Concord's public schools. Our daughter returned to complete her pre-medical studies at UNH at both the Manchester and Durham campuses and with that strong preparation went on to medical school at Johns Hopkins. I graduated from medical school at Dartmouth and am a pediatrician on the staff of Boston Children's Hospital. I have graduate degrees from Yale University and the University of Connecticut and am an assistant professor at the Harvard Medical School and fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

I was able to attend the hearing before the Executive Council on January 31st. There, Mr. Edelblut's relationship with Patrick Henry College and his obligation to incorporate the College's statements of faith and biblical worldview fully into his professional life came to light. At that hearing, Mr. Edelblut also responded inaccurately to questions from Councilor Papas about his position on banning conversion therapy for gay and lesbian minors. These deeply troubling revelations merit your close scrutiny.

New Hampshire's public schools are responsible for the care and wellbeing of all of our children, whatever their sexuality; our public schools are responsible for HIV/AIDS prevention education, suicide prevention, and, unless parents opt out, sexual education. While Mr. Edleblut is free to worship as he pleases, he is not free to impose his theological agenda on our public schools, children, families, and communities, most especially when that agenda poses a direct risk of harm. Conversion therapy uses techniques such as shame and aversive conditioning to suppress specific sexual attractions and identities. When minors seek assistance with issues of sexuality, they must receive competent therapy, not a response which is condemned by the following leading professional organizations:

Personally and professionally, I have witnessed the despair of children and teenagers when their sexuality is denounced, a despair which all too often leads to self-harm, a life in the shadows, or even death.

If Mr. Edleblut cannot unequivocally state that he is opposed to conversion therapy in our public schools, he should not receive your support.

This letter is to express the strong concerns the National Association of School Workers New Hampshire Chapter (NH-NASW) has with the nomination of Frank Edelblut as Commissioner of Education. Social workers make up the vast majority of mental health professionals in our country and state with over 600 members in New Hampshire.

The NH Department of Education is responsible for the education of all students, regardless of their socio-economic standing, and overseeing federal and grant funding that supports homeless children and youth, substance misuse prevention, and pro-social behavior that facilitates learning and college and career readiness. Guiding school districts in creating places of learning that support all students, families, and communities is the cornerstone of the Department. Based on Mr. Edelblut's previous legislative statements, his beliefs seem to not align nor embrace the long-standing commitment of the Department to developing a high-quality system of public education for all children.

Mr. Edelblut is well known for his divisive statements in the Legislature, based on these statements and Gubernatorial campaign records, he appears to be a vocal opponent of a strong public school system. Additionally, Mr. Edelblut's stated views on social issues, including his defense of conversion therapy on gay minors, raises valid concerns that his policies may not be inclusive of all students. His stance on the issue of full-day Kindergarten indicates that he is comfortable only with having school districts that can afford to implement full-day Kindergarten provide it. This basic lack of understanding of the value of early learning experiences and its impact on children and om future workforce is alarming. Mr. Edelblut's position on school choice, while on the surface is laudable, when put into practice could dive1t money from school districts further endangering the education of the children from our most vulnerable communities.

There is no evidence, based on public record, that Mr. Edelblut has the experience or the knowledge to be Commissioner of Education leading New Hampshire's public schools and serve our 180,000 students.

NH-NASW finds it ill-advised to support and appoint someone such as Mr. Edelblut who has never held a leadership position in a public school and has expressed his opposition to supporting a strong public school system. While NH-NASW welcomes innovative approaches, Mr.Edelblut is seemingly coming to the table with a focus on vouchers which serve to undermine public education along with social issue views that may radically change what our students can learn in a public school classroom and which students have access to the supports they need to learn.

Dear NH State School Board:

I am writing to strongly oppose the nomination of Frank Edelblut as Commissioner of Education. Mr. Edelblut is unqualified for the job as he has neither the educational/professional background required by law nor any professional or personal experience with public schools. In addition, the positions that Mr. Edelblut has taken are outside of the mainstream. New Hampshire is at the forefront of public education reform at the movement. Our PACE program has garnered national attention at both the government and non-government levels. It would be a real shame to see the state take a step backward. As a parent and a public school teacher for more than 25 years, I am asking you to reject his nomination.

Mr. Edelblut has no background in education. His educational background is in business and theology, not education. He did not send his kids to public schools and his only experience in public education seems to be in opposing it. He supports vouchers that take taxpayer money and gives it to private and religious schools. He has opposed full-day kindergarten and seems to support the teaching of creationism in public schools, a clear violation of the separation of church and state mandated in the First Amendment.

Mr. Edelblut has been unclear about how he feels about statewide assessments. While I welcome a discussion on the value of statewide tests, his responses on that issue concern me as the state moves towards performance assessments that really show what students know and are able to do. His views on this issue need to be fully explored before he is confirmed.

I am concerned about positions that Mr. Edelblut has taken that are outside the mainstream. He voted against banning gay conversion therapy, and seems to be against providing special needs students with the services they need, as evidenced by his vote against a bill that required the Department of Education to assign a reading specialist to support schools with dyslexia. Clearly Mr. Edelblut does not believe in providing all students with the tools they need to succeed. There are many questions Mr. Edelblut needs to answer before his nomination is considered let alone approved. The ones that matter most to me are:

- 1. Should creationism be taught in public school science classes?
- 2. Should weapons be allowed on the premises of public schools and day care centers?
- 3. What protections would he support for LGBQT students?
- 4. What are his positions on the inclusions of special needs students? Does he believe in mainstreaming? How does he propose to serve students with special needs?

Educating and empowering children to achieve their greatest individual potential is one of the most important tasks of a civil society. Mr. Edelblut is the wrong choice to serve as Commissioner of Education who is tasked with overseeing the education of all of New Hampshire's youth.

Through strategic litigation, public policy advocacy, and education, GLBTQ Legal Advocates & Defenders works in New England and nationally to create a just society free of discrimination based on gender identity and expression, HIV status, and sexual orientation. We have done ground-breaking work in schools, ensuring that LGBTQ children are safe, welcome and included.

LGBTQ youth are among our most vulnerable. According GLSEN's 2015 School Climate Survey, "schools nationwide are hostile environments for a distressing number of LGBTQ students, the overwhelming majority of whom routinely hear anti-LGBT language and experience victimization and discrimination at school. As a result, many LGBTQ students avoid school activities or miss school entirely." According to this study, 57.6% of LGBTQ students felt unsafe at school because of their sexual orientation, and 43.3% because of their gender expression. These statistics are unacceptable. New Hampshire needs a Commissioner of Education who is committed to ensuring the safety and inclusion of all children, particularly our most vulnerable.

Mr. Edelblut has taken positions that would actively undermine the well-being of LGBTQ youth. In his short tenure as State Representative, Mr. Edelblut sponsored the so-called Parental Rights bill. Ostensibly, the bill would have provided that parental rights to direct the upbringing and education of their children shall not be infringed. In reality, the bill would have given parents veto power over public education and would have undercut the ability of schools to teach about diversity, equity and inclusion for all, including LGBTQ people. Thank you for this opportunity to speak. My name is Diane St Germain and I live in Center Barnstead. I taught in Barrington, Strafford and Nottingham for thirty-three years as an elementary classroom teacher, reading teacher and special education teacher. My children attended New Hampshire public schools and my daughter is a graduate of UNH.

I have submitted a letter to board members, but after hearing the governor speak yesterday on *The Exchange* I would like to add some comments.

In promoting Mr. Edelblut yesterday, Governor Sununu stated that his nominee wants to allow students to have more choice **in the public schools** and to allow students to drive their own solutions and define their own pathways. If that's what he truly believes then Mr. Edelblut would *not* be promoting charter schools and vouchers that would siphon funding from public schools. He would be fully supporting public schools in their efforts to do just what he is proposing.

Governor Sununu also said yesterday, that Mr. Edelblut is the most qualified person he knows in the state to lead New Hampshire schools into the 21st century. If this were the case, Mr. Edelblut would know that in the 21st century, the most successful public schools in the world have foundations that are in stark contrast to what he espouses.

The foundation for the world-class education system of Finland for example, has three characteristics that make Finnish schools an international model of success:

1. Systematic focus on teacher and leader professionalism

- 2. The building of trust between the society and its public schools
- 3. Investment in educational equity rather than competition, choice, and other market-based reforms

(Finnish Lessons 2.0, Pasi Sahlberg, 2012)

So, in contrast to what Governor Sununu said yesterday, his nominee is out of touch with what is needed to lead schools into the 21st century. His policies would undermine the success of our schools by eroding trust between society and our public schools and by constructing barriers to investment in education equity-- the foundation of the most successful public schools in the world.

Please insist that Governor Sununu rescind this flawed nomination. Thank you.

Public Comment in Opposition to Frank Edelbut for NH Commissioner of Education State Board of Education, February 14, 2017

My name is Zandra Rice Hawkins and I'm the executive director of Granite State Progress, a multiissue advocacy organization working on issues of immediate state and local concern. I'm here today to testify in opposition to the nomination of Frank Edelblut for NH Education Commissioner. We believe that the candidate is unfit for the job.

To start, Frank Edelblut lacks the necessary qualifications to lead the Department of Education. He has no formal background or training in education. He has never once served on a local school board. He home schooled his own seven children but has no experience with public schools, which the majority of our state's children attend.

The state law is very clear: the commissioner must be qualified "by reason of education and experience." Edelblut fails to pass the test on both counts. His only real experience with public education includes voting to divert taxpayer dollars to private and religious schools, opposing full-day kindergarten, and allowing parents and guardians to opt their students out of the statewide assessment test. (HB1192, Roll Call #129, 3/10/2016; HB1563, Roll Call #42, 2/10/2016; HB 1338, Roll Call #155, 3/23/16)

This last one is curious, because on his Live Free or Die candidate questionnaire just a few months ago, the only question Mr. Edelblut skipped was whether he thinks statewide assessment tests should exist or what alternative he would propose. (LFDA, <u>Frank Edelblut</u>) Certainly an individual who voted to allow parents to opt-out of the testing and who is now willing to accept a nomination for Education Commissioner should have a well-defined and articulate position on this policy. Mr. Edelblut should be asked whether he believes New Hampshire should have statewide assessment tests, and if not, what alternative he would propose.

However, Mr. Edelblut's lack of qualifications isn't the only reason he is unfit for the job. As Commissioner of Education, Frank Edelblut would be responsible for the adequate education and safety of all of our school children. That's why it's so concerning that:

• Mr. Edeiblut sponsored an ALEC model Parental Rights Amendment that would remove community protections for children. This bill would have given a parent the final word on their child's health, education and welfare – even if it meant the child was put at risk or danger. Advocacy groups spoke out against this bill here and in other states because of the potential for it to remove community protections for children and/or to interfere with an adequate and inclusive education, including whether to provide any education at all. Mr. Eldelblut should be asked whether parents have a responsibility to educate their children, and whether the government has a compelling interest to ensure a minimum level of education for children. (CACR16. Roll Call #134. 3/10/2016 ALEC Model Legislation: Parental Rights Amendment)

 Mr. Edelblut voted against banning unethical gay conversion therapy seeking to change a child's sexual orientation or gender identity. In testimony, Edelblut compared this anti-LGBT counseling to counseling to end a smoking, drinking, or drug habit. He also spoke out against the Obama administration's Department of Education guidance on transgender students which sought to ensure transgender students enjoy a supportive and nondiscriminatory school environment. (<u>HB1661, Roll Call #167, 3/23/2016</u>)

When asked about this during the Executive Council public hearing on his nomination, Mr. Edelblut purposely downplayed his position on conversion therapy and LGBTQ rights in general, saying his testimony on gay conversation therapy was for technical purposes only. However, our organization filmed that hearing and last week released the video of Mr. Edelblut testifying for 20 minutes on the topic. He's also spent at least seven years fundraising for a college that considers marriage equality a sin and openly prohibits students from being gay, lesbian, or transgender. The college states very clearly that those connected with it have a responsibility to "integrate a biblical worldview into all aspects of their professional lives." Mr. Edelblut's anti-LGBTQ background and activities raise real concerns about whether he will work to ensure all children have a safe and welcoming learning environment in New Hampshire. He should be asked what he will do to ensure those children have positive school experiences.

• Mr. Edelblut also voted against requiring the Department of Education to designate a dyslexia specialist to support school districts with dyslexic students. The bipartisan bill, which became a law despite Edelblut's vote, required the Commissioner of the Department of Education to designate a reading specialist to provide support and resources to school districts for identifying and assisting students with dyslexia and related disorders and their families. The bill originated from a study committee that was tasked with identifying ways to improve outcomes for dyslexic students. Why did he vote against it? (HB1644, Roll Call #44, 2/10/2016)

Furthermore, we have not heard what Mr. Edelblut believes is working for students with special education needs and what he think needs to be improved. Since Mr. Edelblut homeschooled his own children, does he have an understanding of the different educational challenges facing some children in our community, and does he have any experience at all in addressing those challenges? These are real questions to be answered, and the learning curve is steep.

- Recently Mr. Edelblut refused to answer a reporter's question about whether he'd support teaching creationism in science curriculum, stating: "In science, we should study all theories of human origins, all legitimate or substantive theories of human origins ... What I would advocate is for good science, and good science should support all theories of human origins, whatever they might be." He again ducked the question when asked by Councilor Volinsky during the Executive Council nomination hearing. Mr. Edelblut needs to answer: Yes or no, does he believe creationism should be taught as a valid scientific theory? (Union Leader, Former opponent Edelblut tapped by Sununu for top education post, 1,18.17)
- Also on the topic of science, Mr. Edelblut does not believe that man-made climate change is real. During a WMUR political debate last fall, Mr. Edelblut claimed it is unknown whether climate change is man-made, despite wide-spread scientific consensus it is. There is a real conversation taking place in America's classrooms regarding teaching

children fact-based science around man-made climate change, and even Mr. Edelblut's fiercest supporters brought this up during the Executive Council hearing– albeit in support of Mr. Edelblut and in opposition to the new science standards. Mr. Edelblut told members of the Executive Council that he does not need a background in education because he will rely on the experts, but when it comes to creationism in the science classroom or whether humans contribute to climate change Mr. Edelblut has chosen not to listen to experts.

At the same time, Mr. Edelblut asserts the Education Commissioner has no role in science curriculum, standards, or oversight. We are very concerned about whether Mr. Edelblut fully understands the role of the Education Commissioner since he continues to punt on serious questions. His response on all of the tough questions is to say "it is up to the local school boards" or to defer to the State Board of Education. It does not seem that he believes he has a responsibility or duty to be able to answer any of these questions himself. And that's without even getting into other important things we should know about a potential NH Education Commissioner, such as whether he believes New Hampshire should accept federal funding for education, or what kind of relationship he believes should exist between the homeschooling community and local school districts, including what the responsibility of local school districts and the Department of Education is in these instances.

Its half-way thru the school year, Mr. Edelblut does not have time for on the job training. We need to know right now how he would handle various situations, and how he would represent the NH Department of Education.

It is important that we speak up for a strong public education, and for leaders who will create a positive learning environment for all children regardless of their background, identity, or ability. We strongly urge the State Board of Education to tell Governor Sununu that he should find a candidate better suited to the position.

Good Morning,

My name is Pam Wicks, I'm a mom to 3 boys who attend the public schools here in Concord, NH. I'm here as a public school advocate and to speak out against Governor Sununu's nomination of Mr. Edelblut for the Commissioner of Education for the state of NH.

NH public schools deserve better than this nomination. While I have no reason to doubt that he is the nice man I have read about, that does not mean that he is the right person for this position. We need a leader who understands the struggles of our public schools. Not someone who is going to advocate for more funds to be diverted to charter schools, or shape NH's educational goals to reflect his personal religious views. Not someone who advocates a taxpayer subsidy for wealthy families to send their children to private or parochial schools and not someone who has never spent time in a public school, as a teacher, administrator, PTA volunteer or sat on a school board.

At his nomination hearing he asked why we have seen a rise in Charter schools and his answer to his own question was; that public schools are not offering a product that parents are happy with. The real answer is that they get the advantage of playing by their own rules. They get to cap their class sizes. They can cherry pick the students they want. If they have a child that is difficult, or a child with needs they don't want to support, they can send them back to the public schools. And even at that point, if they don't succeed, they have no requirement to meet any of the standards that our public schools do.

Public schools are there for everyone, no matter what. Our schools teach both our gifted kids, those with special needs and everyone in between. If more kids move into the area, we adjust to make room for them. If they don't have the money to add another class, the classes just have to get bigger. If there is a reason our school can't meet a child's needs, the taxpayer foots the bill to meet their needs elsewhere.

Public Schools are held accountable for how they spend the people's tax dollars. We have a board, we hold public meetings, you are able to see the budget and provide input and in most towns you vote on the budget. If a town decides they don't like the budget, then they vote no and the cuts are made. The schools hands are tied. Public Schools require transparency. You know exactly how your tax dollars are being spent in the public schools. Charter Schools do not have the same accountability and are not held to the same standards. Public schools focus is always on what's best for the students, and they do everything they can to provide the best education to each student that walk into the doors, but when the funds are not there, the programs they are able to offer are limited. Charter Schools do not have those limitations.

We need someone at the helm focusing on making our public schools better, not transitioning handpicked children into better "choices". Over the last few years, the public schools in this state have been pioneering major advances with competency based assessments and the PACE program, something that I can tell from experience with my children, has them excited for tests (my oldest son thought the final science test project was so cool he brought it home and built new ones).

I want to make sure that we have someone that is dedicated to strengthening the public schools not hindering them. I want someone who has been in the trenches with our teachers and administrators and understands their struggles and success. Someone that understands the limitations that our public schools have when we put all the burden onto the taxpayers of our towns. Someone that has actually had a child in a public school. I urge you to please reconsider this nomination and find someone who better understands public education. Every child deserves a chance to succeed, not just the ones a charter school picks.
